Recruiting and retaining undergraduates from underrepresented groups in STEM programs

Thursday, March 1st 12pm (CST): Fostering a Community of Excellence in Science (FACES) at Hope College.

Presenter: Anna Bonnema, Hope College Director of the FACES mentoring program for STEM undergraduates

Description: With funding from the Howard Hughes Medical Institute, Hope has created the FACES program to support and encourage students to persist in STEM fields. This webinar will describe the first two years of this new peer-mentoring program for mostly minority students in STEM disciplines. Group activities, both social and academic as well as peer-mentoring are the primary ways that Anna has fostered a strong sense of community among these nearly 40 first year and upper level students.

A record 140 students and faculty came to the Undergraduate Research Symposium at Washington University in St. Louis over the shortened weekend of October 28-29, 2011. Students from all 14 member campuses made 35 oral presentations and 78 poster

presentations. On Saturday morning, Dr. Bill Hammer from Augustana College presented the 4th Annual Janet Andersen Lecture entitled "Dinosaurs on Ice: Antarctica during the age of reptiles."

Fall 2011 Speaker Visits and Short Term Consultations

In early December Dr. Sara Emerson from the Biology Department at Lawrence gave a seminar at Gustavus Adolphus College entitled "Predation risk, habitat use, diet selection of Samango monkeys in South Africa."

In early November Dr. Amy Kolan from St. Olaf's Physics Department went to the University of Chicago to work with Physics Professor Leo Kandanoff on Vpython, a software package that can be used in first year curriculum.

On Sept. 23 and 24th Laura Peterson from Environmental Studies and Chemistry at Luther College consulted with Brock Spencer from Beloit College Chemistry on Environmental Chemistry courses and a possible field site in Italy. She also gave a talk on bio-geo-chemistry climatology.

On September 21st Liviu Mirica, Assistant Professor of Chemistry at Washington University spoke at Macalester College on "Late Transition Metal Catalysts for Small Molecule Activation: Relevance to Renewable Energy Catalysis."

On September 15th Nicholas Kooyers, a PhD candidate from Washington University gave a lecture to Sara Emerson's Plant Animal Interactions class and met with students and faculty.
